



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This patient reminder card contains important safety information that you need to be aware of before and during treatment with Flixabi.

Please read the Flixabi 'Package Leaflet' carefully before you start using this medicine.

It is important that you and your doctor record the brand name and batch number of your medicine.

Infections

Before treatment with Flixabi

- Tell your doctor if you have an infection even if it is a very minor one.
- It is very important that you tell your doctor if you have ever had TB, or if you have been in close contact with someone who has had TB. Your doctor will test you to see if you have TB. Ask your doctor to record the type and date of your last screening(s) for TB on the card.
- Tell your doctor if you have hepatitis B or if you know or

suspect you are a carrier of the hepatitis B virus.

During treatment with Flixabi

• Tell your doctor straight away if you have signs of an infection. Signs include a fever, feeling tired, (persistent) cough, shortness of breath, weight loss, night sweats, diarrhea, wounds, dental problems, burning when urinating or 'flu-like' signs.

Pregnancy, Breast-feeding and Vaccinations

 In case you have received Flixabi while you were pregnant or if you are breast-feeding, it is important that you inform your baby's doctor about it before your baby receives any vaccine. Your baby should not receive a 'live vaccine', such as BCG (used to prevent tuberculosis) within 12 months after birth or while you are breast-feeding, unless your baby's doctor recommends otherwise.

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
